Chimpanzees

Chimpanzees live in forests in Africa. Their long arms help them swing from the trees.

Chimpanzees sleep in nests in trees. They build a new nest every night.

Chimps live with lots of families in a colony. The baby chimp keeps close to its mother for three or four years.

Did you know? Spiders can't see very well. They use the hairs on their bodies to help them find their way.




Lightning and thunder

A flash of lightning is a spectacular sight. Lightning comes from giant storm clouds, called cumulonimbus clouds. They are full of water droplets and bits of ice that are flung up and down by super-strong winds.



Stoom clouds can be 15 killsmense tall?

Inside a storm cloud, the water droplets and bits of ice crash into each other. This makes electricity in the cloud. When there is too much electricity for the cloud to hold, the electricity jumps to the ground making a giant spark. This is lightning.







King of the rainforest

Danger larks at every level of a tropical trainforest.

Animals on the ground must watch out for the biggest
cat in the minforest, the jaguar. The jaguar likes to
provi along tree branches, searching the forest floor
for mice or larger animals such as monkeys, tapirs and
door. This big cat moves very quietly on packled paws.

The jaguar's spotted coat helps it to blend into the rainforest shadows so it can crosep up on its prey. It swins and climbs trees well. A jaguar hunts alone and can hook out fish from the river with a pass.

A jaguar will even fight an alligator and its powerful jaws can cut through a turtle's shell. These cuts usually hant at night and they have excellent eyesight. Jaguars rest and sleep in the trees, often with a leg or tail hanging over a branch.

Building at Giza


The biggest monument at Gips is the Great Pyramid. It is the tomb of a plantoch called Khufu.

Building the Great Pyramid probably rook rhousands of seedless more than 20 years. It was made from more than 2.5 million stone blocks, weighing between 2 and 15 tonnes each. The stone was cut from quantes and carried down the Nile in barges. Then labourers leaded it on to wooden shells and dragged them over rolless to the site.

The builders probably built rungs from mod brick and soil to pull the stones up. Later they knocked the rungs away. Secret runnels led to the build chamber, scaled with massive stones. Even so, their treasures were stolen by robbers.

landing gear Aircraft wheels used for landing, take-off and moving on the ground.

lift An upwards push made by a plane's wings.

spy plane A plane that flies high in the sky and takes photographs of the ground below. thrust The push made by a plane's engines.


turbine Part of a jet engine, a bit like a fan. It spins when gas rushes through it.
