World Refugee Day is on 20 June every year. This date was chosen by the **United Nations** in 2001 to help us learn more about refugees. Refugees are people who leave their homes to look for safety in another country. They leave because they are threatened by war, disasters or **persecution**.

## What is it Like to be a Refugee?

Refugees often have to leave their homes quickly without taking money or belongings. When they reach a new country, they have no homes or jobs. Often they don't speak the local language. Many people live in refugee camps with thousands of other refugees. They must rely on **organisations** to give them food and shelter until they can return home. More than half of refugees are children. Many do not have an adult to look after them.
